I. Prayer is important

A. Definition

Prayer is talking to God.

Jesus' concern for the children of God took more of His heart that He had to come up with the formulae of how to reach out to the Father: Matthew 6:7—13

B. Key Scriptures

Jeremiah 33:3; 1 Thessalonians 5:17; Psalm 91:15

II. Basic principles

A. Guidelines for prayer

Who can pray?

Anyone can pray.

Whose prayer does He promise to answer?

God promises to answer the prayers of those who have received the Lord Jesus as Savior from sin.

When can you and should you pray?

Anytime.

Where should you pray?

Anywhere (e.g., playing, in school, while walking, in bed).

You do not need to always kneel or close your eyes.

Why are prayers hindered?

Unconfessed sin hinders prayers (Ps. 66:18; 1 John 1:9).

How do you pray?

Pray according to God's will (1 John 5:14, 15).

Pray in Christ's name (John 14:13, 14; 16:23, 24).

Pray in faith (Mark 11:24; James 1:6, 7).

What do you pray for?

Praise God for who He is.

Thank God for what He has done.

Confess sin.

Pray for others with specific requests.

Pray for yourself.

- B. How does God answer prayer?
 - 1. He always does what is best for us.
 - 2. If according to His will, He will answer "yes" (1 Kings 18:37, 38; Judg. 6:36-40; Gen. 24:14, 18).
 - 3. If it would not be good for us to receive, God graciously answers "no" (2 Cor. 12:8, 9).
 - 4. If it is not God's perfect time, He will answer "wait;" an example is the Israelites and their deliverance from Egypt.
 - 5. God sometimes answers by giving us more than we asked for (Eph. 3:20).
 - 6. God sometimes answers before we call or voice the desire (Isa. 65:24).
 - 7. God answers prayer to glorify Himself (Ps. 50:15).

III. Practical "how-to" ideas

A. Use the following acrostic "A-C-T-S" to remind the children of four things they can pray about:

A—Adoration

Adoration is telling God how much you love Him. You can tell Him why you appreciate Him or how wonderful and great He is (Ps. 95:3; 104:1).

C_Confession

Confession is naming your sin and admitting to God that you have sinned. When you confess your sin, He will forgive you (1 John 1:9). Talk to God about it when you know you have sinned.

T—Thanksgiving

Give thanks to God for what He means to you or has done for you (1 Thess. 5:18). Thank Him for what He has given you (salvation, food, clothes, family, friends).

S_Supplication

Supplication is to ask humbly or earnestly. Talk to God about the needs of other people (sickness, problems, their need of salvation). Pray about your own needs and requests (Phil. 4:6).
